

CATHOLICS FORGETTING THE IMPORTANCE OF THE FUNERAL MASS/LITURGY

The Catholic funeral is at the heart of who we are as Catholics – a people gathered, saved, and redeemed by Christ our risen Lord! The Catholic funeral is a witness to a secular world that there is a greater context to both life and death. The Church teaches that "deceased members of the Christian faithful must be given ecclesiastical funerals according to the norm of law." (Canon 1176) Sadly, secularism is taking away this important aspect of our Christian life. We today in an alarming situation are witnessing that practicing Catholics are not having funeral Masses/liturgy. This is a great loss and mistake.

This might be the decision of the deceased family members who are not Catholics. The choice of a family to forego all things "Catholic" for a funeral be-cause they are not or no longer Catholic even though the deceased was Catholic and was sincere in practicing his or her faith is unfair to the deceased. It is important to note! A funeral should respect who a person is and a person's faith tradition is an essential component of who one is and the hope we have

Project Compassion envelopes and money boxes are now available in the pews of the church, or from the Parish



A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Luke

Jesus told a parable to his disciples, 'Can one blind man guide another? Surely both will fall into a pit? The disciple is not superior to his teacher; the fully trained disciple will always be like his teacher. Why do you observe the splinter in your brother's eye and never notice the plank in your own? How can you say to your brother, "Brother, let me take out the splinter that is in your eye," when you cannot see the plank in your own? Hypocrite! Take the plank out of your own eye first, and then you will see clearly enough to take out the splinter that is in your brother's eye.

'There is no sound tree that produces rotten fruit, nor again a rotten tree that produces sound fruit. For every tree can be told by its own fruit: people do not pick figs from thorns, nor gather grapes from brambles. A good man draws what is good from the store of goodness in

his heart; a bad man draws what is bad from the store of badness. For a man's words flow out of what fills his heart.'
